A Victory for 211 Illinois

We are thrilled to share the exciting news from this most recent Illinois legislative session. The 211 Illinois board has secured a \$3 million grant for fiscal 2023-2024 to support 211 services and expand coverage to uncovered counties. The funding announcement is a huge victory and will allow 211 Illinois to plan for and strengthen the future of our statewide 211 network.

This challenging and tireless work to expand 211 coverage for all Illinoisans has been led by 211 Illinois Board Chair, Kristi Long, who also serves as President & CEO of United Way of Lake County. Thanks also to Steve Carlson and Glenda Abbott who continue to champion Lake County's 211 and serve on the Illinois 211 Board, as well as Kelly Cotter and Michelle Crombie who provided tremendous support on the grant application and submittal process.

United Way of Lake County is proud to help lead the way to bring 211 services to all Illinois communities and be a model program. 211 has now expanded to more than 90% of the state, up from 36% just a year ago. As of right now, 7 million more Illinoisans have access to 211!



### Mental Health Awareness Month: #MoreThanEnough

This year, NAMI is celebrating Mental Health Awareness Month with the More Than Enough campaign. It's an opportunity for all of us to come together and remember the inherent value we each hold—no matter our diagnosis, socioeconomic status, background or ability. The campaign's message is that no matter what, you are inherently worthy of more than enough life, love and healing. Showing up, just as you are, for yourself and the people around you is more than enough.

Mental health is one of the most important aspects of our overall well-being and it affects how we think, feel and act. However, mental health issues remain highly stigmatized and often go undiagnosed or untreated due to the lack of awareness, accessibility and resources.

To address this issue and improve access to life-saving resources, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) approved 988 as the new three-digit emergency number that connects individuals in crisis with mental health services. This change has made it easier for individuals in crisis to access professional support and intervention services.

If you or someone you know is struggling with thoughts of suicide or experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis, call or text 988, or chat 988lifeline.org to reach a trained crisis counselor, 24/7.

If you're looking for information, support or access to resources, call 211 or text your zip code to 898-211 to connect with a caring person who can help guide you. 211 is available 24/7 with English and Spanish-speaking support and interpretation to more than 150 languages.

You are not alone. Help is here. Talk to someone.





## 211 Training for First Responders

Earlier this month, we conducted 211 training during three shifts of roll call briefings at the Lake County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Idleburg wanted to ensure that deputies understood how 211 could help them in their work with community members. The training included an overview of 211, examples of how 211 can connect community members with essential information and resources, and a review of the differences between 211, 911 and 988. We provided 211 information for deputies and materials to hand out to community members.
