Honoring Our Veterans: Resources and Support

As Veterans Day approaches on November 11, we recognize and honor the dedication and sacrifice of those who have served our country. Across Lake County, many organizations are committed to supporting veterans, active-duty service members, and their families by providing essential services and care.

Midwest Veterans Closet

Based in North Chicago, Midwest Veterans Closet serves as a "one-stop shop" providing clothing, household goods, furniture, and food to veterans, active-duty personnel, and their families—all at no cost. By helping meet day-to-day needs, the organization ensures that those who have served can access the essentials and stability they deserve.

Additional Organizations Serving Veterans:

- Veterans Assistance Commission of Lake County (VACLC) Offers free guidance from accredited Veteran Service Officers on VA disability claims, appeals, survivor and burial benefits, and emergency financial assistance.
- <u>Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs (IDVA)</u> Helps veterans and their families navigate federal, state, and local benefits, providing long-term care and connecting them to resources for education, mental health, housing, and employment.
- <u>Lake County Veterans and Family Services Foundation (LCVFSF)</u> –
 Provides peer support, family services, and alternative therapies, including equine-assisted activities and community gatherings.
- Captain James A. Lovell Federal Health Care Center (Lovell FHCC) A
 partnership between the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and
 Department of Defense offering comprehensive healthcare, including
 medical, dental, and mental health services.
